

WE ARE HCC

FROM THE **PRESIDENT**

Thank you for taking time to read Haywood Community College's Annual Report for the 2021-2022 Academic Year. This year was an exciting return to many events and activities, for students, employees, and our community.

In April, HCC's Wildlife Society hosted a "once in generation" event on campus – the Southeastern Wildlife Conclave. Over 300 students from 17 colleges and universities across the Southeast came to HCC to compete in a variety of challenges to test their knowledge, skill, and teamwork.

Throughout the year, the College continued to make progress on new facilities and emerging technologies. Progress continued on the construction of the Health Sciences Education Building, with the added excitement of securing grants to support the integration of state-of-the-art technology for student lab and simulations spaces. Renovations also began on the Workforce and Industry Training Center to bring short-term workforce training and enhanced learning spaces to HCC's High-Tech Center location. Two large grants were awarded from the Department of Labor and Golden LEAF totaling over \$2.5 Million to add programs in construction, plumbing, HVAC, truck driver training, and electrical line worker.

In the Summer of 2021, HCC launched a new Strategic Plan, with an emphasis on five goal areas. Read more about the Strategic Plan on page 2. Throughout this report, you'll find the year's events and activities organized around these five goal areas: Enrollment, Engagement, Infrastructure, Employees, and Student Success. In this way, HCC is focused on our bright future – working together to make our goals a reality.



RECOGNITION

Haywood Community College was ranked among the **top 10** community colleges in the nation. A study from SmartAsset analyzed the student-to-faculty ratio, graduation and transfer rates, and the cost of tuition and fees at more than 800 community colleges nationwide, and HCC ranked number nine overall.

ABOUT HCC

Haywood Community College was founded in 1965 and continues to offer an array of affordable programs with small class sizes so students receive the personalized attention they deserve.

Aside from classroom instruction, students have the opportunity to participate in hands-on learning experiences through their program and student clubs.

Tucked away in the Great Smoky Mountains, the campus is a designated arboretum and features walking trails and a recently upgraded disc golf course.

The campus woodlands contain over 1,000 trees, which range in age of up to 140 years old. Today, the arboretum provides an outdoor laboratory for many fields of study and provides a beautiful college campus for students and the community to enjoy.

The **Bobcat to Bulldog Promise Program** was established in August between HCC and the University of North Carolina – Asheville. This program provides HCC graduates direct admission to UNC-Asheville which offers a collaborative partnership focused on bridging student pathways to success in Haywood County, Western North Carolina, the State of North Carolina, and beyond. HCC students can obtain their associate degree for guaranteed admission to UNC-Asheville with no additional application fee. This agreement also prioritizes the ability to receive admission, financial aid, registration and orientation communications early in the transition process, setting HCC students up for maximum success at both institutions.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO **VISIT**

HCC welcomed representatives from the **University of Idaho** as their team explored the many aspects of our Natural Resources program. Students graduating from this program area will have the opportunity for a direct transfer to the University of Idaho as they continue to pursue their career path in the Natural Resources industry.












WEBSITE

HCC was able to work with local nonprofits to finalize the distribution of all the donated items to ensure those that needed supplies had it then and into the months that followed the initial event.



Leaders from Haywood Community College, Blue Ridge Community College and Asheville-Buncombe Technical College have been working on a joint leadership program and in 2021 this vision became a reality. BUILDING WORKFORCE TRAINING





HCC welcomed Senator Kevin Corbin and representative Mike Clampitt for an update on plans to enhance workforce and industry programs with a new grant to expand training for construction trades. This program offers a core construction class and subsequent focus areas for specialization opportunities

To make all these classes become a reality, the Workforce Training Center has undergone a renovation project to create dedicated class space at the facility and obtain the necessary equipment to train students in each program and focus area.



DEPARTMENT OF LABOR GRANT

In late 2021, HCC was excited to receive the news that the Department of Labor fulfilled a grant request of \$1.196M to provide a construction program for the community. This short-term training program provides the opportunity for students to learn about three different trades in the construction industry, in addition to an introductory construction course. This program is a partnership with the Haywood County Detention Center, Southwestern Workforce Development Board, and local construction, plumbing, and HVAC businesses. This initiative provides a pathway of rehabilitation for individuals who have been incarcerated looking for re-entry into the workforce with High School Equivalency certification and job skills training. Additionally, this program provides the training needed for anyone to enter the industry as well as training for current construction business employees.

GOLDEN LEAF FOUNDATION GRANT

The Golden LEAF Foundation awarded Haywood Community College \$1.45 million to upgrade facilities to prepare individuals for high-demand infrastructure and construction fields, including energy, communication, transportation, and construction industries.

The funds will be used to begin programs for electrical lineworker, truck driving and broadband technicians. Each of these programs will provide short-term training that will lead to careers that are in high demand and provide a solid career, all while supporting our local communities.

The Electrical Lineworker course will give students the skills and knowledge to join the workforce after completion of a 16-week course. Participants will learn the knowledge and skills to install, maintain, and repair power transmission lines.

In the 9-week Truck Driver Training Program, students can earn Class A and B commercial driver licenses and will find ready employment to help to address the shortage in our region and across the nation.

Funds from Golden LEAF will be used to redesign space to allow for these new programs to accommodate large trucks and an outdoor climbing lab for hands-on training.

This initiative is a competitive process that focuses on a region and is designed to identify projects aligned with Golden LEAF's priority areas of job creation and economic investment, workforce preparedness, and agriculture that are ready for implementation and have the potential to provide a significant impact.



Thanks to a grant from the Haywood County Tourism Development Authority, HCC had the opportunity to expand and refurbish its Disc Golf course. Improvements were made to pathways, basket placements, and tee boxes. To celebrate the renovation, a ribbon cutting and Bobcat Tournament were held on campus for disc golfers to experience the new course and share their positive feedback.

MOON TREE

During the Earth Day celebration held on campus in the spring of 2022, HCC officially dedicated its **moon tree** that has been on campus since the late 1970's.

Upon receipt of the young tree, HCC's horticulture technician and grounds crew member worked with students to plant the tree on campus.

This special tree continues to receive recognition through coursework in the Natural Resources program and in April, an official dedication ceremony occurred with a plaque to mark the tree and the original horticulture technician, Doyle Justice, present for the ceremony.




MOON TREE

In 1971, Apollo 14 Astronaut Stuart Roosa carried small cans of seeds to the Moon as a favor to the US Forest Service. The seeds from loblolly pines, American sycamores, sweetgums, redwoods, and Douglas firs orbited the Moon thirty-four times. After the flight, the Forest Service germinated the seeds and compared their growth to seedlings that had not been to space. Several years later, the government shared the young Moon Trees as gifts around the world. HCC's Moon Tree is an American sycamore.


REVENUES(in millions)






CLYDE'S





FISH & WILDLIFE GRADUATE

CHAD FISHER

Fighting Fires from the Arctic Circle to the Everglades-A Haywood Community College Fish & Wildlife Graduate's Career

Haywood Community College 1990 Fish and Wildlife Management graduate Chad Fisher has spent a career fighting fires from near the Arctic Circle to the Everglades of South Florida and a lot of country in between. After many years of experience, Fisher was named the Chief of Wildland Fire for the National Park Service in March of 2021. In this position, Fisher leads the team responsible for operations, science and ecology, and planning and budget for the service's wildland fire management program.



"Early in my career, my favorite parts of the work were the people I worked with and the sense of camaraderie we had from the shared effort of hard work," Fisher explains. "Today, the best part of the job is knowing I can have an impact on the generation of fire managers just behind me and the generation behind them who are getting started in their career. It's exciting to think I can share a vision of how the National Park Service wildland fire program can be successful for the next decade."

Fisher came to HCC after graduating from Rosman High School. During his last quarter of school at the college, Fisher took a field trip to multiple locations across the state, and it was during a connection made on this trip that he landed his first job in the field. "At Mattamuskeet National Wildlife Refuge, we met with the fire management officer who told us they were interested in hiring firefighters for Pocosin Lakes National Wildlife Refuge. I started a job there within weeks of graduating."

After working in the field for a while, Fisher returned to the classroom at the University of Montana, where he received a Bachelor's degree in resource conservation. "Due to the strenuous academic component of my education at HCC, I was well prepared when I decided to pursue my Bachelor's degree," he says. "I really liked the hands-on learning environment at HCC and the challenge set forth by our instructors. These instructors set a high standard and expected us to meet them, yet they were there to help us as well. I do believe it set me up to move into the career field with a foundation of understanding of what would be expected in the workplace."

Throughout his career, Fisher has held several field positions, including being a Hot Shot, smokejumper, helitack crew leader, and Wildland Fire Module leader. In these positions, he jumped, hiked and flew into fires as part of a highly-skilled crew. These jobs require high qualifications with extremely effective results through a variety of fire operations. He was a training specialist and wildland fire safety program manager for the National Park Service and national fire training specialist for the United States Fish and Wildlife Service. Prior to his most recent promotion, Fisher served as the National Park Service's wildland fire operations program leader since 2017.

Fisher lives in Boise, Idaho with his wife and two sons.

BIOLOGY SPECIMENS




