ontinuing to move forward in business is crucial, any business owner or leader would echo this. At Haywood Community College, the team is constantly looking for opportunities to move forward.


The Public Services department at HCC received a grant earlier this year which supports high-cost workforce startup needs. This grant will be utilized, in part, to purchase high-fidelity mannequins and a mobile simulation ambulance. This equipment will allow increased hands-on learning for EMS students and the ability to practice scenarios in the field. This will lead to HCC's training becoming one of the few colleges in the state to perform simulated procedures in an actual ambulance versus only in the classroom or other mobile unit that may not reflect the realism of an actual ambulance.

In addition, students will receive practical experience with constructing a candy board, making sugarcandy, and insulating colonies in the HCC Apiary. Examples of projects and goals could include learning to throw larger amounts of clay on the wheel, further exploration of using templates to slab build various forms, or diving into surface design with texture and carving. Class size is limited so that students receive plenty of one-on-one instruction as they work on their projects. Cost includes one bag of clay, use of classroom glazes and kiln firing. require a separate setting for a finished piece. Cloisonne uses wires to separate the cells of color. Combining these will give you a piece that has the best of these techniques. Students will need a prior jewelry making course where they learned to use a torch and jewelers saw and other basic jewelry making tools. This can be a second step class for those learning about jewelry making. Skills Covered in this class: Designing an enamel piece; texturing metal; making samples; washing enamels; fusing the base; finishing your enamel piece. Please wear closed-toed shoes. 


